CITY OF DURHAM PARISH COUNCIL

Minutes of a meeting of the Business Committee held on Wednesday 9th November 2022 at 13:00 via Zoom

Present: Councillors E Scott (in the Chair), E Ashby, G Holland, R Ormerod and N Brown.

Also present: A Shanley (Clerk) and Ms Emma Wright (Durham BID).

1. Welcome and apologies

None received.

2. To receive any declarations of interest from members

None received.

3. To receive and approve as a correct record the minutes of the meeting on 15th September 2022

The minutes of the meeting held on 15th September were unanimously **agreed** as a true and accurate record of proceedings.

4. To receive any public participation comments on the following agenda items.

None received.

5. Report by retail consultant Graham Soutl on work in Durham City

Graham Soutl provided a presentation on his work as Parish Council retail consultant since the last meeting.

Graham advised that he had met with a number of new businesses in the City, including the new Durham Ginstitute on Silver Street, Bookwyrms and the new Christmas pop-up at Prince Bishops.

Graham advised that he had recently been on BBC Look North talking about business rates and promoting a positive image of Durham City. Graham advised that 35 new businesses had opened up since the lockdown in Durham City.

Graham highlighted that Tortilla had recently opened in Durham City (where Clintons was originally located) and had been featured in the Northern Echo.

Graham also advised that the Northern Echo had recently run a story highlighting that "Independents were key to Durham City's future".

Graham also advised that he had attended the recent "Future of the High street" event and had spoken about the positives of Durham.

Graham also advised that he had recently met with the organisers of the Durham Fringe Festival – a fantastic event for the City – and Graham advised that he is working with the organisers to promote this event into the future.

Graham welcomed the renewal of the Durham BID ballot and advised that he continues to work proactively with Paul Howard, Durham BID Manager.

Graham also advised that he was meeting with Durham Distillery and Danielli Holdings (STACK). Graham advised that he is keen that STACK includes some retail element to it and not just food and drink vendors.

Graham advised that he had been promoting pop-up business opportunities for Prince Bishops over the Christmas period.

Graham particularly highlighted that Silver Street is looking much better with new businesses coming in, including Vodafone to the old Post Office building.

Cllr E Ashby advised that she was opposed to licensed premises along Silver Street and highlighted that STACK has already confirmed that there will be no retail going into STACK.

The Chair thanked Graham for his excellent report.

6. Update from the Chair on her work as Portfolio Holder for Economy and Partnerships

The Chair advised that she is due to meet with the new owners of Prince Bishops soon and she expected that accommodation to the upper floors would be part of their plans.

The Chair also advised that she was pleased to see Silver Street looking a lot better than it did 12 months ago with 6 new businesses having now entered the street.

The Chair remarked how pleased she is to see the weir at Milburngate being cleared and thanked the County Council for taking on this difficult task.

The Chair advised that she was also able to arrange some additional financial support from the County Council for the Christmas festival and thanked Colin Wilkes for his exceptional work on this.

The Chair advised that she had recently met with the organisers of the Durham Fringe Festival and she was pleased to see that Visit County Durham is now supporting this event. The organisers of the Fringe are also talking about having some live Shakespeare on Palace Green too, which sounds like a fantastic idea.

The Chair also advised that DCC is considering making the Park and Ride service a 7 day per week service (including on a Sunday). The Chair also advised that the Free After 2pm scheme is also set to come to an end and this may be picked up again in quieter times.

9. Update on proposals relating to ongoing engagement with local landlords

The Clerk presented a copy of a proposed landlord survey to the Committee.

Councillor E Ashby advised that she would also like for the survey to be in an electronic format for ease of return by the landlords. Councillor E Ashby also advised that she felt that the surveys should be posted – as opposed to hand delivered – in order to cover the large numbers of landlords in the City.

Councillor E Ashby advised that she had concerns about Box 3 included as part of the survey and felt that this may negate the effects of the rest of the survey.

Councillor G Holland advised that he would prefer it if Box 3 could be removed entirely from the survey.

It was **agreed** that the question of asking landlords for a contribution towards the Parish Council precept should be put to Full Council in February 2023 after the precept and Band D charge had been agreed by Council in January 2023.

It was **agreed** that Box 3 should be replaced with the question "*what more can the Parish Council do to work in partnership with the private rental sector in Durham City?*"

It was also **agreed** that the survey should also include a note saying "*thank you for taking the time to complete this survey*".

It was **agreed** that the final sentence should read "*would you like to be kept updated on this Parish Council initiative?*"

It was also **agreed** that this survey should be launched in the New Year.

10. Update on events in the City planning

The Clerk advised that the last aspects of planning for the Remembrance Sunday event are well underway and all was going well.

The Clerk advised that he had received some outstanding feedback about the Paw Patrol event and he had asked for some footfall stats from the Durham BID manager. The Clerk advised that he thought it was brilliant to see the half-term holiday week so busy for events.

The Chair advised that Durham Lumiere is happening once more in 2023 and the County Council has just received the Arts Council grant for the event.

11. Proposal to establish a railway station adoption group

It was **agreed** to defer this item until a later meeting whilst other projects are ongoing.

12. Update on the work of Durham BID

Emma advised that a pop-up museum focusing on sports history is taking place at Walkergate.

Emma also advised that the Gruffalo character is going to be in place at Clayport Library.

Emma advised that the Christmas light switch on is taking place once more this year and the BID is excited to be welcoming Joe McElderry to the event to carry out the official switch on.

Emma also advised that the BID is arranging a series of Christmas events over the December period – including street entertainment, the Grinch and various other events.

The Committee thanked Emma for her positive update.

There being no further business, the Chair thanked Members for their attendance and contributions and closed the meeting.

ITEM 8: PROPOSAL FROM DURHAM PRIDE ON PRIDE EVENT 2023

Introduction

Durham Pride marks its 10th anniversary in 2023. As part of that milestone, we propose a day of celebration for LGBT+ personnel serving in the British Armed Forces, past and present.

Our chair is an Army Air Corps veteran and although proud of his service, has always felt a stigma as when he decided to leave the Army on meeting a same sex partner and accepting his sexuality, it was then illegal with punishment of up to 7 years in prison and a dishonorable discharge. He considers himself lucky as many LGBT+ were imprisoned and/or discharged, affecting their job prospects and lives forever.

This is the backdrop for this idea, and we are inspired by his courage and determination to celebrate people who at the time, put their sexuality second to their devotion to serve their country. He also wants to recognize the positive strides the Armed Forces have made and celebrate serving personnel, highlighting equality and diversity but also letting the public know that LGBT+ people are putting their lives at risk today, in service of them and their country.

We have enlisted the help of 3 forces veterans charities Fighting with Pride, SSAFA and East Durham Veterans to help us plan and deliver this day of celebration. We are also fortunate to have the support of Col (Ret'd) Jeremy Cook OBE AAC who is now the Pro-Vice Chancellor for Colleges at Durham University.

The outline

The day will be held on Saturday 27th May 2023 from 12pm to 10pm on the Sands Field with a beer tent, fairground, food court, market stalls and entertainment for all the family to enjoy. It will be free to enter, and we will encourage the three regular services LGBT+ forums to get involved. We are inviting the Army Cadet Force, Air Training Corps and Navy cadets as well as TA units from across the North East.

We hope to have a fun 'Battle Challenge' competition with prizes for winning teams. We also hope to have Armed Forces stands/displays and recruiting information stalls. The day will include some archive material to include the proud history of the DLI and hopefully some personal testimonies from people about their experiences from those who served and those who are serving now in different arms of the UK forces.

Support

We would welcome ideas from anyone around the day and what people would like to see whilst maintaining the military LGBT+ theme. We would also welcome volunteers for a variety of tasks they would be interested in performing. Perhaps a network veteran's team for the 'Battle Challenge' would be fun!

Funding

We are looking at what funding is available for this type of event; we did put an application into the Armed Forces Covenant Fund, but this was unsuccessful. Any ideas around how we might fund the day would be very welcome. We have funds ringfenced for the Pride event the following day but not enough to cover both days. Many funders do not offer support for 1-day events which makes this day more of a challenge, but we are determined to deliver this for the county.

Durham Pride is looking for total funding of £6,000 towards this 1-day event and any support would be greatly appreciated.
